TWO GREAT PARTIES



The IKCA has just had a couple of the **greatest parties** of its history, which is saying a lot because we're a partying group. First was the Judan party where the first promotion to 10th Degree Black Belt was celebrated. What a fantastic evening it was. I would like to thank everyone who attended once again. The brotherhood was running rampant that night. I got to see people I haven't seen in too long. Mr. Steve Muhammad came from Atlanta as a special treat and I was awarded the BKF Warrior Patch by Mr. Darrell Jones, the president of the BKF. He announced that this was the eleventh patch of its kind to be awarded in the thirty-one years the BKF has been in existence. What an unbelievable honor.

Then came the International Karate Connection Championships, which is really, a party to end all parties. The best parties I have ever attended have had some sort of theme or activities. In other words: party games. Well the Championships have to be the best games imaginable, the IKCA Master form, the Black Belt Triathlon and the Team Event. And what games they were!

At the First Championships, everyone who attended said it was great. We felt they were being generous. We knew where we had to make adjustments so this

year it would truly be great, and it was. This year when people told us they had a fantastic time we knew they really meant it. We have been to a ton of tournaments and this was one of the smoothest and certainly the most enjoyable we've ever attended, let alone been directly involved in. What a pleasure.

The level of competition has definitely improved from last year, as was expected. We knew that anything as revolutionary as the events for the IKCA Championships would take some time to work themselves out and actually it's happening sooner than we expected.

Last year there was a great deal of nervousness involved. It was brand new and off the wall to all of the competitors. Some handled it better than others and they usually turned out to be the winners. Those that competed last year had that experience behind them and it made it a lot easier for them this year. There were several others who didn't compete last year but had the opportunity to observe, which put them a leg up as well.

The under Black Belt divisions went off very well and while they were competing we organized the Junior Black Belt division as well as the Senior Men and Women's Black Belt divisions so the competition ran very steadily from one division to the other.

Unlike many tournaments where they are run like a Dance School Recital or a Little League Ball Game where everyone gets a ribbon, metal or trophy just for showing up, we restricted the winners Medallions to those who really win. We wanted to allow everyone there to compete but if a division was made up of only two or three contestants there was only a first place medallion awarded. If the division had four or five there was a first and second place awarded. For a first second and third place to be awarded there had to be six or more contestants.

THE MASTER FORM

As in any competition there were some disappointments. The biggest disappointments came to those competitors who seemed to regard the Master Form as a race. They were so engrossed with the notion that they had to beat the other guy's time that they forgot that the most important element of the Master Form is ACCURACY. Every move of the system is represented in the Master Form and the accuracy of those moves is of utmost importance. Without absolute accuracy there is no meaning to the form and therefore to the system when practiced through the Master Form. Period. If there is a block, with a maneuver that's followed by several blows to various targets and those moves are not clearly defined and on target, what would the purpose be? If the hands simply wave in the general direction of the attack and the blows aren't fully developed to the location of the targets they are intended to strike, there's no purpose served at all and that was the problem some of the competitors had in trying for speed. Their moves were too foreshortened and undeveloped or were otherwise so far off target it earned them deductions they would otherwise not have gotten.

The most important thing to remember when doing the Master Form, whether it's solitary practice for yourself, doing it as part of the test for rank or in an IKCA Tournament is that you must hit all of the targets all of the time and that includes the blocking of the blows. The blocking and parrying must be done with all of the snap and conviction you would have done them with, had a real fist been flying toward your face or a real foot toward your groin.

To make it feasible for judging, the judges are to assume that all of the attackers (all fifty eight of them) are the same size of that individual competitor. That way all of the strikes can be judged reliably for all of the competitors. If you are very tall and are in the habit to shooting most of your blows at a downward angle, you will have to keep this in mind when competing. The same goes if you are of below average height and are used to shooting at an upward angle. You'll have to alter where you would be shooting, to someone your own size. It's the only way the judging can be done consistently.

As you can see, there are a few things that are a challenge to this sort of competition; things that don't otherwise come up in the normal study of the Art. But it's these kinds of challenges we find exciting. Incidentally, if you are doing this form in an Open Tournament, don't worry about those things. The judges haven't the foggiest notion where the blows belong or for that matter what you're even doing and you can get away with murder. We know people who do the form only until they get tired and then stop. They still walk away with a trophy so that might give you an inkling of what that kind of competition is all about. That's what makes the IKCA Championships such a unique event.

THE TRIATHLON

Now here's a bird of a different feather. I still maintain that the IKCA Triathlon competition is the toughest of all Martial Arts competition to date. To ask what is asked of these competitors is just plain cruel. But it's the only way we know of that allows the competency of the practitioner to be judged by an absolute set of standards. It works for competition and it works in the training itself. The only downside is for those who don't have enough people to practice with on a regular basis; although, the winner of

the third place medallion in the Triathlon was Alan Nisberg of Tampa Florida. Alan is a video student who has a very small contingent of students he teaches mostly for his own enjoyment. It's a private thing, not a commercial enterprise. So, most of the time he doesn't have enough people to run a semi-circle and as you know by now that's the make-it or break-it part of the three events. Running the Line and Striking the Dummy are certainly important but it's the Semi-Circle that puts your tush on the line. Oddly enough, it's the Striking the Dummy event that landed Alan in third place, because of time. If there is a tie score, it's the amount of time you spend beating the Dummy that breaks the tie and determines the winner. However, accuracy is still more important because if one or the other of the tied contestants were to have had one less deduction, he or she would automatically have been the winner. So, think it over remember how early in your training we stressed ACCURACY - SPEED and POWER, in that order? Well, it still goes. You can be the fastest dude in town but if you can't hit the target you're kidding yourself.

THE TEAM EVENT

The team event was perhaps the most interesting of all. I had the pleasure of spending a large part of the evening, after the Tournament, with an old friend and Kenpo compatriot, Jack Autry and was more than pleased when he looked me in the eye and said, "I am impressed." Jack has been around for a long, long time and for him to say that with the obvious sincerity he displayed, said a lot to me.

One of the reasons for the favorable impression, I'm sure, was that he got to see something that you aren't likely to see in many other places in this world, <u>if at all!</u> And that something is <u>STANDARDIZATION</u>.

Mr. Autry is well aware of the problems concerning American Kenpo insofar as standardization is concerned. He told me that several years ago, after the untimely passing of Ed Parker he and a group of high-ranking Kenpo Black Belts tried to implement a program of standardization within the system and in his words, "it failed miserably".

The particular thing that I am referring to, concerning the standardization of IKCA Kenpo, is not only the fact that all of the students do all of the basics and techniques exactly the same and can be judged as such for competition purposes but when it came to the "Three Person Team Event" we were all blown away. What happened was that each of the three teams that were going to compete had lost, for one reason or another, a member that had been practicing with them so they each showed up with only two and were going to be unable to enter the competition. Being

the resourceful Kenpo people they are, they began talking to people they had never even met before that day and each team was able to pick up a third member. As it happens, one team picked up another local person but that person had never done the form with them. The other two teams found someone far removed from where they come from. Leonard Mushtuk from Canada teamed up with Val and Mari Holms out of Montana. Glen Lyman and Curtis Tate from Cedar City Utah teamed up with Paul Metz from Wisconsin. Ronnie Rodriguez and Efren Palacios both from Bellflower, California teamed up with Robby Barnett of Los Alamitos California. The later three know each other but Robby had never done the three-man form with Ronnie and Efren.

When the competition began it was hard to tell these teams had never worked on this exercise before that day. In fact had you been told they were doing it daily you would have believed it. In looking at the video I am still amazed at their performances. It's a shame they couldn't all have been awarded a medallion but as the judging proved, the team to beat was Ronnie, Efren and Robby who took home the "Iron".

What a fantastic job they did. You have to remember, this is a team event. Meaning that if a member of the team is not where he or she is supposed to be at a particular moment in time and with the proper attack from the proper distance, it throws the flow of the action off, if not stopping it completely, and that in itself can drop you out of the competition.

Because each one of the teams was actually a "pick-up" team" it made it an even more exciting event than it would have been had they all been highly practiced and rehearsed. What it showed of course is that the moves and the system itself are so standardized that a person unknown to you and trained hundreds or even thousands of miles from you can just drop into a complex series of moves such as those that comprise the three man form and fit in perfectly, like a piece of a jigsaw puzzle. That's one of the things Jack Autry saw and that impressed him. Hell, it impressed me and I'm getting harder and harder to do that to.

All in all the IKCA Championships 2000 were exactly what we wanted. And yet, we will strive to make it even better in the future. How we are going to do that isn't exactly clear at this point but we are thinking about next year even now. As an example, we will be experimenting with video as a method of judging the performances of our brave and resourceful competitors. We have some ideas that could make the judging easier on us and even more absolute for the competitors as well. As fine as the judging was this year, we are looking to the future and the possibility of help from the magic of video, which we already know and love.

THE BLACK BELTS DO IT AGAIN

In the last issue of the Newsletter, if you recall, there was a vote put to the IKCA Black Belts. It concerned time in rank for Degrees within Black Belt.

We had received a suggestion that with the study of extra material the time between promotions for degrees might be reduced. The time factor was a year for every three subjects studied, within a two year period. The limit would be two promotions under those conditions. It was also suggested that an instructor might advance a year earlier for having a student of his or hers win the Video of the Year Award or if the student were a video student he or she might be eligible for winning it themselves.

To cut through the confusion and get right to the heart of the matter - don't worry about any of the above because the Black Belts, in their infinite wisdom voted the whole thing down. Resoundingly Down!

The votes and accompanying letters we received indicated overwhelmingly that they loved the idea of extra material and the subject matter to be offered when a student becomes a Black Belt but that material should have nothing to do with degrees of Black Belt. Again - It ain't broke - so don't fix it!

So, there it is. The Black Belts came through once more. It's difficult for us to know when a suggestion is brilliant or a bust but so far it seems the plan as first devised is alive and doing extremely well.

Please don't let the above discourage you from making your feelings and ideas known to the Association.
